
**VOTE NOV 3 2020** 

On November 3, 2020, Shakopee residents will be voting on a funding request for an operating levy to help the school district:

- Maintain quality programming and learning opportunities
- Attract, retain, and fairly compensate high-quality teachers
- Build a path to long-term financial stability

#### WHAT IS A LEVY?


Teachers, classroom supplies, custodians, food service staff, instructional materials, teaching assistants, bus drivers – these are the people and things needed to educate our 8,000 students. Operating levies provide funding for these critical school costs.



## HOW IS SHAKOPEE DIFFERENT?

Shakopee is the only one of comparable districts in our area without a voter-approved operating levy—which means we don't have the additional financial support that many communities provide to help operate their schools.

## VOTER-APPROVED OPERATING LEVY (2020-21)



Shakopee Public Schools has no voter-approved operating levy, putting us about \$1,250 below the metro average. The last time voters approved an operating levy was more than a decade ago.

#### WHY NOW?

The School Board's unanimous decision to put the operating levy on the ballot was based on several months of discussions, community input and review of various options.

93% of our residents agree: Strong public schools are directly linked to the quality of life and viability of our community.

The levy request is in response to a number of financial pressures that will result in expenses exceeding revenue starting in the 2020-21 school year—challenging the District's ability to maintain the quality education students deserve and the community expects.

These pressures include state funding that has not kept pace with inflation, unfunded mandates and the lack of a voter-approved operating levy for additional local support.

### A SHARED PARTNERSHIP

To limit the levy request amount, the School Board also approved making a series of budget cuts, reinforcing the shared partnership between schools and communities.

The levy request to the community is combined with \$2 million in budget cuts that have already been approved by the School Board, creating a fiscally responsible, conservative and balanced approach to addressing financial pressures.

## WHAT IF IT FAILS?

If voters do not approve the levy request, the school board has already approved an additional \$5.4 million in budget cuts that would be necessary in 2021-22.

These cuts would include:


- × Classroom teachers
- × Class size increases
- X Staff at all levels
- X Academic support positions
- × 5th grade band
- X Middle school athletics

This would bring the total budget cuts in the district to \$7.4 million over the next two years.

# Continued pressure on the budget a result of inadequate funding

If state funding had kept pace with inflation since 2003, Shakopee Public Schools would have received an additional \$5 million in state aid in the 2019-20 school year alone.

#### **FAST FACTS**

Shakopee ranks 11th out of 12 comparable school districts in beginning teacher salaries, and Shakopee ranks in the bottom quarter of these districts in terms of teacher salaries across a teacher's career.

- We pay nearly \$9 million annually for unfunded education mandates that are not being reimbursed from the State or Federal government as promised.
- Our school district
  has a lower tax rate
  than many neighboring

amount of commercial property in Shakopee — which means we get more bang for our taxpayer buck.

We have been working hard to live within our means and have made a number of budget reductions over the past four years.

## PHASED-IN LEVY

If approved by voters, the per-student operating levy would be phased-in over four years: \$400 per student in 2021, \$300 in 2022, \$200 in 2023 and \$100 in 2024.

Due to building debt that is being paid off, there would be no net school tax increase until 2022. Because the levy would be phased-in, the tax increases would be phased-in as well. Even once the levy is fully phased in, Shakopee will still receive less than the current metro average of voterapproved levy funding from its community.

\* School tax impact estimates are for this referendum only and are based on the \$280,000 average home value in the district. Debt being paid off is factored into the 2021 tax impact calculation.
