Comparing Two Things: Use -er

My notebook is **thicker** than your notebook.

Summer is **hotter** than autumn.

The mouse turned out to be **braver** than the lion.

Comparing Three or More Things: Use -est

Her notebook is the **thickest** notebook in the room.

August is usually the **hottest** month of the year.

The **bravest** people are not always the **strongest** or the **biggest**.

Spelling Comparatives

harsh harsher, harshest (ends with consonant digraph = no change)

weak --> weaker, weakest
(vowel digraph = no change)

slim -> slimmer, slimmest
(closed syllable, final consonant =
double the consonant)

early -> earlier, earliest
(ends with -y, change y to i before
adding -er, -est)
